



TYPES OF ALARMS



Smoke, heat, flood or CO – with the Cavius alarm family you are able to protect your entire home from fire.

Alarms installed in the home saves lives. More than half of house fire deaths occur in homes with no working smoke alarms.

- F**ire Safety Tips:
- If a fire occurs in your home: GET OUT, STAY OUT and CALL for help.
 - Install alarms on every level of your home.
 - The alarm should be vacuum cleaned and tested once per month.
 - Talk with all household members about a fire escape plan and practice the plan twice a year.

It is recommended to place at least one smoke alarm on every level of the home - especially in hallways and bedrooms. Do not place a smoke alarm too close to a kitchen appliance or fireplace, as this may result in false alarm.



Heat alarms are normally used in environments where a smoke alarm would generate false alarms - such as kitchens, garages and rooms with fireplaces/stoves.



CO - carbon monoxide - is known as the “silent killer” because it is odorless, tasteless and colorless. Place it near sleeping areas - in the level where you breathe - and on each floor. Do not place the CO alarm right next to or over a fireplace or flame-producing appliance.



Flood alarms are placed in rooms where there is a possibility of ingress of water and risk of hoses leaking such as basements.
